A Message from the Martha Associate Director

Throughout these long and difficult months we have continued to witness loss of life due to the virus, horrific acts of violence in our communities and in our world, acts of hatred against those with different skin colors, different religious beliefs, prejudice and intolerance for those who live on the margins, civil and world unrest, and here, in this beautiful place we call home, Canada, the horror, reality and truth we must face as a country and as a Church, with regard to the discoveries of many unmarked graves found at

the Residential Schools in the West, and the treatment of our Indigenous peoples. There are times I am sure that we have not learned anything from the mistakes of our past because we keep repeating the same mistakes!! Why is that?

As always, it is important to name and be aware of the reality we are in, the painful truths of our time. Our eyes and ears must be open, our minds must be open, but most of all, our hearts must be open. Reflecting on the words of Pope Francis: “Never lose Hope” and from the Martha Direction Statement: “In the face of our reality, we dare to stand in undaunted hope”, I am reminded that hoping and trusting in our God will lead us through all that we must endure and along every road we must travel. God’s love in the spirit of Jesus will guide our way!

Referring to my “gloomy” thoughts, I pondered them again in the light of “God with us in all things” and in the light of hope. Even though we are still in a pandemic, I am grateful for the brilliant scientific minds that God has crafted for so many wonderful purposes, including the development of vaccines in so short a time to combat Covid 19. I am grateful that the sharing of these vaccines around the world will eventually control the spread of this virus. I am grateful to recognize God’s presence in all those who have spoken out against hatred, abuse, violence and racism in all its forms and for those who stand in solidarity and hope alongside all people who suffer the consequences of these evils. I feel deep pain and sorrow

over the contribution our Roman Catholic Church has had in the suffering of our Indigenous Brothers and Sisters, yet grateful for the difficult truths that must be freed in order for reconciliation and hope to thrive. I have hope that we can make a better world, one act of love at a time!

I am reminded of the words of the Prophet Isaiah:

“Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength,

They will soar on wings like eagles,

They will run and not grow weary,

They will walk and not be faint.”

(Isaiah 40:31)

Sometimes it is hard to feel that sense of hope. Hope requires a deep trust and confidence in our God. When we dare to allow ourselves to place all our trust in God, our Creator; in Jesus, our beloved friend and Lord; in the power of the Holy Spirit, hope cannot and will not fail us. Hope will lift us up; it will carry us forward.




We were saddened when we learned about the children’s unmarked graves found at residential schools in the West.

NACAR

Martha Justice Ministry Coordinator

This June has marked my first year as Coordinator of Martha Justice Ministry with the Sisters of St. Martha, Antigonish. It has been a year full of meeting wonderful people, learning and growing in our social justice and ecology work, and engaging in advocacy on issues of importance locally, nationally, and internationally.

Prior to arriving in Antigonish, my husband and I moved between PEI (Epekwitk), where I grew up, and Ottawa. I did my PhD in Theology and Ethics at Saint Paul University in Ottawa. While finishing my doctorate, I was blessed to work as executive director of Galilee Centre, an Oblate retreat centre in Arnprior, ON.

I did post-doctoral work at UPEI and then returned to Ottawa, where I worked at Citizens for Public Justice as a socio-economic policy analyst. The focus of my work there was poverty eradication in Canada, and I had the wonderful experience of working on the Dignity for All campaign, which pushed for a poverty eradication plan for Canada.

My experience, ranging from academic research and teaching, retreat centre program development, and policy



analysis and advocacy, has led me to Martha Justice Ministry, which brings all those pieces together! The richness of the Marthas' charism of Gospel hospitality provides the theological and spiritual foundation from which the work of this ministry flows.

This year, with the guidance of our Core Group, we have been able to build on the work already started, through groups, networks, and campaigns focussed on poverty eradication, Indigenous rights and reconciliation, climate justice and creation care, and more. And, of course, we have continued our wonderful New Growers program, mentoring young farmers.

It has been a real blessing to enter into this work, and I truly look forward to our continued spiritual growth, learning, and relationship building.

I am grateful to be able to contribute to the wonderful work of the Marthas through this ministry!

News From The United Nations NGO

Last year **Covid-19 lockdown** changed many things for all of us as global citizens. Our hearts still go out to all persons who lost loved ones to the pandemic, the suffering of so many people and the grieving which will be with us for a long time. Front line workers are also part of our prayer.

Covid created a great set-back for the implementation of the **UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)** and Agenda 2030. The United Nations report on the SDGs states that with Covid-19, much of the success since 2015 was lost. The gap between persons living in poverty and those living with wealth has grown. Now is the task to creatively restart the implementation so “no one is left behind.”

The 59th UN Commission for Social Development was held virtually February 2021. **The theme was “A socially just transition to sustainable development: The role of digital technology and the well-being of all.”** This covered areas of human rights, governance, education and social protection for all and finances.

The Civil Society Declaration states “Digital technology has shrunk the planet, galvanized voices for social change and transformed the way we live forever. By enabling access to communication and information globally, technology has opened new doors toward advancement around the world. Now more than ever, synergies to pursue and adapt to a sustainable development that leaves no one behind must be explored and put in practice” “We are truly confident in the transformational power of a Digital Technology Revolution based on human rights and dignity, and guided by the values of inclusion, equity, security and transparency”. This last sentence is what guides us in our use of digital technology. We all use technology as we are able and is appropriate.

Let us rejoice about this! Bill C-15: An Act Respecting the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous

Peoples establishes a clear and on-going legal Commitment for the federal government of Canada to ensure that its laws, policies and programs are consistent with the global human rights standards affirmed in 2007 UN Declaration. As of June,2021, The UN Declaration for Indigenous Persons is now legislation in Canada. It is a framework for dialogue between the Federal Government and the Indigenous Leaders. Gospel Hospitality calls us to welcome this into our own lives and be open to what each of us can do to further this dialogue where we live.

I will be leaving this position of Martha NGO Liaison in June 2022. Darlene O’Leary, Co-ordinator of Martha Justice Ministry, will shadow me for this coming year and be the NGO Liaison in June 2022. It has been a privilege for me to journey with the Martha Associates, on many levels, the last 12 years. Thank you for sharing your life and faith with me. I will carry you and your loved ones in my prayers.

Associates as Charism Carriers: Embracing the Call to Leadership



I had the opportunity to spend three days of spirit-rejuvenating learning and reflecting while taking part in the last NACAR-sponsored retreat for Associates and Religious, held May 18 to 20. There were over 200 virtual participants representing numerous Associate groups from all over North America. It was amazing to scroll through the Zoom pages and see the faces of so many Sisters and Associates; all drawn together to share experiences as we find a way forward to live our Gospel call in the face of the reality of our times. There was time to compare notes on how Associates stayed connected through the pandemic; the upside and the downside, and also to voice common hopes, fears and challenges as many Associate groups grapple with the fact that the physical presence of our Religious Sisters is diminishing in our communities.

Our facilitators, Linda Mastro and Amy Kulesa structured the 3 days to incorporate reflection on our individual faith stories, small and large group sharing and prayer. One of the highlights of the retreat was the thought-provoking keynote address provided by Sister Carol Zinn, a Sister of St. Joseph from Philadelphia.

Sister Carol urged retreatants to consider the initial Gospel charism of our Associate groups, and to recall how each of us was attracted to that charism, invited to share in it, and how it has shaped (is shaping) our individual faith journey. How do we keep and share the charism we received through the Sisters who are our conduits to that charism? How have the Sisters lived out that charism? How can we draw on and benefit from the example they have modeled for us as they learned to shift and transform to carry the charism forward through many years of change?

Sr. Carol reminded us that Gospel charism, a free gift of the Holy Spirit, does not change; however, the manner in which a charism is carried forward is constantly unfolding through time, moving at will and always guided by the Holy Spirit. Our task is not to sustain the world we know; but rather to make way for, and participate in the birth of something new that acknowledges and affirms the charism as it is needed in the “now.” We live out that charism in small ways and through larger efforts, in all aspects of our everyday lives, for living the Gospel requires us always to respond to the call to love. Each of us responds as we are; wherever we are in our life’s journey. The Gospels are our daily “how-to” manual as we accept the call.

Throughout the retreat many beautiful prayers and reflections were shared by the facilitators. The prayer entitled “**Patient Trust**” written by Teilhard de Chardin is one I that I particularly appreciate for its reminder to “**trust in the slow work of God.**” At the end of the retreat all of us were left with a lot of food for thought, a feeling of solidarity and much encouragement to “step into the future with undaunted hope.”

I sincerely thank the Sisters of St. Martha and Julia for allowing me the opportunity to be part of these three enriching and spiritually nourishing days of retreat.



“May we continue, through the radical call of the Gospel to be inspired by the Martha Charism, and the Mission, Vision, and Value Statements.” (Associate Prayer)


